Since its founding in 1938, the Fryske Akademy has been dedicated to fundamental and applied research on the Frisian language, history, and culture. After a good 80 years, this task bestowed upon the institute by the Frisian community when it was founded, is still its guiding principle.



The Fryske Akademy in 2021

2021 was in many ways a dynamic year. As in 2020, much of this related to the further implementation of decisions taken in 2019 by the Provincial Council of Friesland. With calm now returning, slowly but surely, vigorous efforts are being made to ensure a positive, productive and relevant future for the Fryske Akademy.

General developments

In mid-March, the interim managing director, drs. Willem Smink, handed over the reins to dr. Nelleke IJssennagger-van der Pluijm, FSA. Together with a professional management team, concerned with operations and decisionmaking, and programme coordinators, focusing on the academic direction - she is involved with developing processes in the new, horizontal organisational structure. The institute's future strategy and research agenda form part of this.

> The reorganisation of the corporate services departments - which began in 2020 - was

completed in May. Further to the changed affiliation with the KNAW (Royal Netherlands Academy of Arts and Sciences) - the Constitution was amended in October. The development of the Innovation Drive-funded projects continued and has led to new research being awarded.

The Fryske Akademy has accepted the role of Vice Chair in the 'Gearwurkingstraject Fryske Taal en Kultuur' (Frisian language and culture cooperation project (GTFK)) run by the province of Friesland. In the framework of this project, the Fryske Akademy is working with numerous other cultural institutions to set up the knowledge agenda for Language and Culture.

Long-term goals

In 2021 the focus gradually turned towards the future and the institute's long-term goals. Work was done throughout the organisation to draw up a draft policy plan for the period 2022-2027.



Academic developments

The first major steps were taken in 2021 towards developing a research programme that is future ready. Under the leadership of a programme coordinator, the staff unanimously decided to define four core areas in the research programme. They are: multilingualism, language, culture, plus history and heritage. These core areas should be seen as research areas that may overlap and represent the commitment to a team of researchers undertaking research both within their own discipline, as well as in the interdisciplinary context.

- → Nooit meer honger en natuurinclusief: Productiviteitsgroei en duurzaamheid in de Friese zuivelsector, 1945-2020. [No more hunger and nature inclusive: Productivity growth and sustainability in Friesland's dairy sector, 1945-2020] was the title of Ronald Plantinga's thesis, for which he obtained his PhD on Thursday 9 September at the University of Groningen.
- → What Frisian verbs of time teach us about language. Anne Merkuur obtained her doctorate at the University of Amsterdam in the Martinikerk in Franeker on Monday 18 October. The title of her thesis being: Changes in Modern Frisian verbal inflection.

PhD research

→ Social media are having a positive effect on Frisian. This was the conclusion of Lysbeth Jongbloed when she was awarded her PhD on Friday 3 September at the University of Maastricht for her thesis entitled: *Frisian on social media: The vitality of minority languages in a multilingual online world.*



Keetje Hodshon Prize for a thesis

→ The Keetje Hodshon Prize 2021 was awarded to dr. Evelyn Bosma for her thesis: Bilingualism and cognition: the acquisition of Frisian and Dutch (2017). The prize is awarded in recognition of original research. It is presented annually for research carried out in one of the following areas: linguistics, literary studies, historical sciences, philosophy or theology.


